Representing All Voices: Gerrymandering and Ranked Choice Voting

Knit Democracy Together is a project created by artist and former election lawyer Eve Jacobs-Carnahan. At each of the six events being held around the state, she will give a nonpartisan presentation and lead a discussion about the electoral system with a focus on New Hampshire's election laws. 2023 Reassessment and Tax Rate

This is meant to be a brief explanation of why some of the residents of Monroe received an increase in property Taxes; for more detailed information or questions, please attend a selectmen's meeting, which occurs every Tuesday night at 7:00, or Budget hearing currently scheduled for February 6th, 2024.

Every year the town receives an equalization report from the state, the report compares market sales to the assessed values of each non-utility property that sold. In 2020, the report showed properties were assessed at 90.1% of their market value, in 2021 the report showed properties were assessed at 82.4% of their Market Value, and in 2022, the report showed properties were assessed at 61.2% of their market value. This steady decline in assessment to sales ratio was due to a steady increase in the market during the pandemic, when the real estate market saw properties often sell overnight for more than list price.

In 2023, the Town's 5-year town-wide reassessment was completed as required by the State of NH; in which towns are required to conduct a reassessment based on current market sales. Given our equalization report in 2022, which showed we were assessed at 61.2% of sales performing a reassessment in 2023 was less than ideal but the year in which it was due. Our contracted assessor worked thru the summer reassessing all non-utility properties in Monroe and concluded his work in late fall, at which time everyone was sent the reassessed value of their property with information regarding scheduling an appointment with the assessor to review the new assessment, if desired. A couple weeks later we received our Utility reassessment which we conduct every year. The new valuations for both utility and non-utility properties were sent to the State of NH DRA who sets the tax rate for the town. The tax rate is based on property values, expenditures voted on at Town meeting, for both the Municipal and local school, along with the towns portion of the state education and county expenses.

In 2021 the Tax rate set by DRA was \$13.11, in 2022 \$12.19 and in 2023 the tax rate was set at \$9.73. Below are some of the contributing factors to the change in tax rate from 2022 to 2023.

- The Municipal tax effort increased by \$84,994 in 2023 over 2022
- The County tax effort increased by \$5761 in 2023 over 2022
- The local school tax effort increased by \$202,773 in 2023 over 2022
- The State education tax effort increased by \$50,985 in 2023 over 2022

This increased spending coincided with our reassessment year, which saw non-utility assessments increase by 63% and utility assessments increase by 28%. In 2022, the valuation of Monroe was 80% utility based. In 2023 with non-utility properties having a larger percentage increase in valuation than utility properties, the town shifted to being only 76% utility based. This 4% reduction moved approximately \$200,000 worth of tax burden from the utilities to the non-utility properties.

In conclusion, there was a variety of factors that contributed to some properties seeing an increase in property taxes in 2023; the increased spending was voted on at the town meeting and was not a result of budgets being overspent. It is important when calculating your yearly taxes to not double one bill, you need to take the total valuation of your property and divide by 1,000, then multiply by the tax rate. The first tax bill you receive each year is estimated at 50% of your yearly taxes. On reassessment years, the estimation can be off, giving you a larger second tax bill.
